

Ready or Not Report 2019

- Examines country's level of public health emergency preparedness on state-by-state basis using 10 priority indicators.
- Highlights 2018 Increase in Weather-Related Emergencies/Other Health Threats
- Major focus on policy recommendations




2018 Notable Policy Actions

- White House releases National Biodefense Strategy
- Administration states renewed Global Health Security commitment - renewed to 2024
- HHS Sec. declared public health emergencies in CA, FL, GA, NC, SC, VA, Northern Marianas, AK, PR, USVI
- Management of Strategic National Stockpile moved from CDC to ASPR







National Health Security Preparedness Index 2018 Release Key Findings

- Five consecutive years of gains in health security nationally: 10.9% increase since 2013 (p<.05)
- 39 states improved in 2017, 4 declined and 8 held steady.
- Largest gains in community engagement, surveillance, and incident management (all p<.05).
- Widening regional disparities due to slower pace of progress in South, Southwest, Mountain West.
- **43**% of U.S. population now live in areas with below-average health security, up from **18**% in 2014.
- 44 states scored above-average in 1 or more domains, and 46 states scored below-average in 1 or more domains. Most lead the nation in some domains, lag in other domains.


State performance, by scoring tier, 2018

| Middle Tier | CA, DC, GA, HI, IA, IL, LA, ME, MI, MN, MT, ND, NH, NM, NV, OK, OR, SC, TX, VT, WV | 20 states and DC |
| Bottom Tier | AK, AR, AZ, DE, IN, KY, NY, OH, PA, SD, TN, UT, WY | 13 states |

Key State Findings - Progress

- 44 state public health labs had plans for a surge
- Most states accredited in public health, emergency mgmt or both
- Most residents had access to safe water






• 89% of hospitals participated in healthcare coalition, on average




Key State Findings - Gaps

- Seasonal flu vaccination rates fell to only 42%
- Only 55% of employed residents had paid time off
- 31 states participated in Nurse Licensure Compact
- 28 % of hospitals earned top-quality patient safety grade

Key Federal Recommendations

- Pass PAHPA
- Provide increased, stable funding
- Create emergency response fund
- Strengthen medical countermeasures
- Address antimicrobial resistance & vaccine infrastructure
- Strengthen healthcare preparedness
- Focus on populations at greatest risk
